Sergeant Lanza, a World War II Veteran, forever remembered

Sergeant William Lanza was shot down over Nazi-occupied Italy in May of 1946 in a B-25 Mitchell bomber along with other members of his crew. Thanks to the pilot and several Italian sympathizers, Lanza survived a prisoner of war camp and escaped. His nephew John W. Lanza captured these exploits in a book taken directly from war stories from his Uncle Bill during his childhood. The book is titled "Shot Down Over Italy."

Last Sunday morning Mayor Brian Arrigo and other elected officials and the Lanza family and friends remembered this war hero in a square dedication in his name, at the corner of Ann Road and Malden Street.
